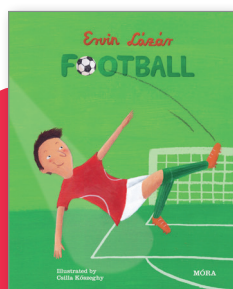


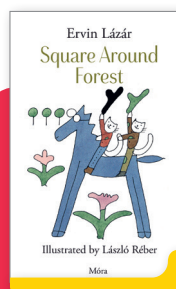
ERVIN LÁZÁR (1936-2006)

...has been a very popular author in Hungary for generations and many of his works became classics in his lifetime. His works still fundamentally shape how contemporary children's fiction is written today. He received IBBY's Hans Christian Andersen prize for his book *Berzsián és Dideki*. Pushkin Press (UK) released his story, *Arnica*, *The Duck Princess* in 2019 and an increasing number of foreign publishers are purchasing the rights to his works.

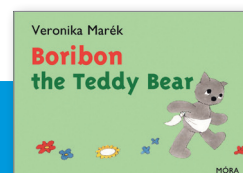
TOMMY AND THE LION

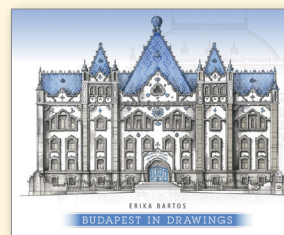
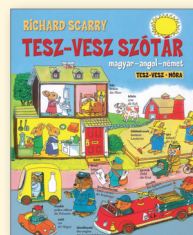


TERRY AND THE DOLL HUNT 4+

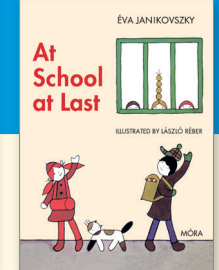

Lavender is growing in Aunt Barbara's garden where she lives with Uncle Balthasar and two dachshunds who romp about and play hide-and-seek all day long.



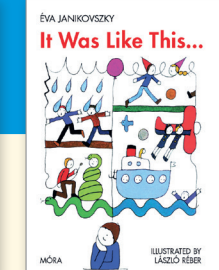
NURSERY SCHOOL HERE I COME

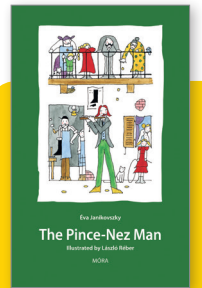

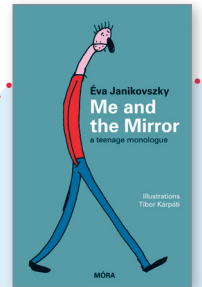
